10. Bausch and Lomb monument

Johan (John) Jacob Bausch (July 25, 1830 – February 14, 1926)[1] was a German-American maker of optical instruments who co-founded Bausch & Lomb (with Henry Lomb). Over six decades he transformed his small, local optical shop into a large-scale international enterprise, pioneering the American optical industry.

Henry Lomb (November 24, 1828 – June 13, 1908) was a German-American optician who co-founded Bausch & Lomb (with John Jacob Bausch) and led a group of businessmen to found The Mechanics Institute, the forerunner of Rochester Institute of Technology.

11. Susan B Anthony

Susan B. Anthony (February 15, 1820 – March 13, 1906) was an American social reformer and women's rights activist who played a pivotal role in the women's suffrage movement. Born into a Quaker family committed to social equality, she collected anti-slavery petitions at the age of 17. In 1856, she became the New York state agent for the American Anti-Slavery Society.

12. Margaret Woodbury Strong

Margaret Woodbury Strong (1897 – July 16, 1969) was an American collector and philanthropist. Strong was an avid collector, especially of toys and her large collection formed the basis for the Strong National Museum of Play.

14. William Carter was the first burial in Mt Hope Cemetery

15. Col Nathaniel Rochester

Nathaniel Rochester (February 21, 1752 – May 17, 1831) was an American Revolutionary War soldier and land speculator, most noted for founding the settlement which would become Rochester, New York.

17. George Ellwanger

George Ellwanger (December 2, 1816 – November 26, 1906) was a prominent horticulture scientist. Ellwanger was born in Württemberg, Germany and emigrated to the United States. Settling in Rochester, New York Ellwanger joined with Patrick Barry to form the Mount Hope Nursery (also known as the Ellwanger and Barry Nursery) in 1840. He also became an American citizen in 1840. In 1843 the nursery began publishing catalogs to increase sales. The Ellwanger family monument in Mount Hope Cemetery was designed by famous Italian artist Nicola Cantalamessa Papotti.

18. Frederick Douglass

Frederick Douglass (born Frederick Augustus Washington Bailey; c. February 1818 – February 20, 1895) was an American social reformer, abolitionist, orator, writer, and statesman. After escaping from slavery in Maryland, he became a national leader of the abolitionist movement in Massachusetts and New York, gaining note for his oratory[6] and incisive antislavery writings. In his time, he was described by abolitionists as a living counter-example to slaveholders' arguments that slaves lacked the intellectual capacity to function as independent American citizens. Northerners at the time found it hard to believe that such a great orator had once been a slave.

24. Elizabeth Hollister Frost and Harriet Hollister Spencer

Twin sisters born on March 1, 1887. Elizabeth, a poet and author published her first book of poems, *The Lost Lyrist*, in 1928 and was working on a book about horticultural interests and projects when she died on April 9, 1958. Harriet was a noted horticulturalist specializing in roses. In 1952 she gave a lecture titled "Herbs from a Tudor Garden" at the RMSC, instigating the creation of the Garden of Fragrance at the Museum, dedicated on June 18, 1958. Harriet died August 28, 1962

26. General E. G. Marshall

Elisha Gaylord Marshall (January 26, 1829 — August 3, 1883) was a Brevet Brigadier General of the Union Army in the American Civil War.

45. Alexander Milliner, George Washington's drummer boy

46. Algernon Crapsey

Algernon Sidney Crapsey (1847–1927) was an American Episcopal clergyman who in 1906 was defrocked after a celebrated heresy trial.

6. Hiram Sibley

Hiram Sibley (February 6, 1807 – July 12, 1888), was an American industrialist, entrepreneur, and philanthropist who was a pioneer of the telegraph in the United States.

Rufus Adams Sibley

Rufus Adams Sibley (December 3, 1841 - May 12 1928) was co-founder of Sibley, Lindsay and Curr, which was for over a hundred years one of the most successful department stores in the United States. It was eventually merged with Kaufmanns in the late 20th century, which became part of Macy's by 2006.

69. Alexander Lamberton

Alexander B. Lamberton was the President of the Rochester Parks Board from 1902 to 1915. The Lamberton Conservatory in Highland Park was named in his honor.

70. William Warfield

William Caesar Warfield (22 January 1920 – 25 August 2002), was an American concert bass-baritone singer and actor. One of his earliest professional engagements was in Marc Blitzstein's Broadway opera, *Regina*. His breakthrough came when he gave his recital debut in New York's Town Hall in 1950. He went on to produce a highly acclaimed album of selections from *Porgy and Bess* with Leontyne Price in 1963. Warfield was a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and a Professor of Music at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and later at Northwestern University's School of Music.
